What are the unique assets that should be preserved/protected in this neighborhood?

- Schools (Burleson Elem., Comstock Middle School...)
- Recreation Center (Janie C Turner)
- Neighborhood Parks & Greenbelt (Trinity Forest)
- The Golf Course
- Police Station (Southeast DPD station)
- Good housing stock with unique home designs
- Proximity to DART train (Lake June station)
- The Horse Park (many activities for children)
- Country Setting (big lots, lots of vacant land)
- Community involvement /Involved homeowners
- Local Businesses –U-Haul, family dollar store (but need improvement)
- Easy access to freeways & downtown





What are some of the challenges/concerns about neighborhood?

- Crime shootings, drug houses, theft
- Poor street and sidewalk conditions (need repairs)
- Flooding/drainage issues (flooding streets & alleys)
- Rental houses not properly maintenance
- Neighborhood upkeep/neighborhood needs a facelift
- Code violations (substandard housing and poor conditions of alleys)
- Access to DART (Green Line) at Jonelle
- Loose animals/stray dogs/people have large number of pets
- Junk cars/many abandoned cars on streets or illegally parked
- Speeding on residential streets (esp. Elam Rd & Pemberton Hill)
- Language barrier, makes it hard to connect/relate with neighbors (Spanish)
- Vacant lots and abandoned homes
- Connecting people to social services; Example assistance for single moms
- Illegal dumping and vandalism
- Addiction (alcohol and drugs)
- Police patrol (not enough)
- Poor street lighting (Stoneport & Sunbriar)





Based upon the assets, challenges and opportunities, what should be the highest priority for this planning project?

- Improving streets and sidewalks (fix Sarah Lee, Pemberton Hill, Elkhart and Hodde)
- Address crime, do something about the drug houses
- Neighborhood upkeep increase code enforcement
- Address rental houses
- Do something about loose animals/stray dogs
- Bring grocery stores (need somewhere to shop)
- Provide services for seniors, need a senior center
- Improve access to DART station (Lake June station)
- Food desert: improve access to fresh produce (Community gardens on city properties)
- Economic incentives to attract businesses to the neighborhood
 - Workforce training and social enterprise
 - Business incubator (Jubilee Center in South Dallas has a good model)
- Early childhood development support (very few day cares)
- Language barrier create ESL program with churches or Rec Center
- Collaboration between the City and services provided by local organization like Care Center ministries





Create a vision statement to describe the future you want for this community?

- 1. A <u>safe</u> neighborhood, with a country feel, <u>well maintained infrastructure</u>, grocery stores and shopping options with services and activities for all.
- 2. A transformed community that begins with <u>people being empowered</u> to become productive and giving back through service.
- 3. A community <u>with excellent schools</u>, quality infrastructure, business ventures, <u>economic growth</u> and active residents with high <u>quality of life</u>.
- 4. A safe community <u>where people care and feel empowered</u> to change the culture
- 5. <u>A vibrant community with retail, good schools</u>, improved streets, adequate street lights and <u>well maintained infrastructure</u> with stable single-family housing and <u>involved residents</u>.
- A nice place to live. "We want to be like Trinity Grove with <u>good jobs</u>, <u>prosperous businesses</u> and nice restaurants." Put the "pleasant" back in the "Grove"









Recommendation Strategies







Neighborhood Appearance & Property Maintenance

- Properties not being adequately maintained, structures need new coat of paint or substantial improvements
- Property owners taking pride in the appearance of their properties
- Lack of maintenance might be contributing to the negative image of the neighborhood
- Illegally parked cars and litter
- Greater neighborhood oversight and code enforcement needed to improve the overall appearance of the neighborhood



Recommendations

Neighborhood Level

- Establish a neighborhood leadership task force, consisting of residents and interested property owners to provide ongoing guidance for neighborhood improvement.
- Encourage "peer pressure" by residents/neighbors so that interested property owners can re-establish expectations that their neighbors also maintain their properties
- Increase awareness of home repair/property rehabilitation programs; also People Helping People (PHP)
- Host "Property Maintenance" workshops
- Establish a "Good Neighbor" program-residents open channels for friendly communications for about expectations for property maintenance



Recommendations Neighborhood Level

- Neighborhood ombudsman-serve as a resource person for sharing residents' *expectations* for property maintenance and nuisance
- Establish a Neighborhood Watch (assistance of DPD)serves as a mechanism for observing and reporting suspicious behavior
- Develop a program to encourage painting of existing homes (home makeover)
- Adopt a trash can providing public trash receptacles on primary routes and intersections



Recommendations

<u>City Level</u>

- Code Crawl/Enforcement walk-through.
- Develop a "*Homeowner Handbook*"- resource guide for maintaining and improving properties in the neighborhood
- Consider increasing penalties for work performed without building permits
- Sign the entrances to Pemberton Hill to communicate the identity of the neighborhood to visitors and residents; establishing the community as a place worthy of distinction.
- Budget for matching funds for sidewalk replacement for the neighborhood- earmark the funds
- Encourage increased owner-occupancy of residential structures. Owner-occupied homes tend to be better maintained. Increasing home ownership in the neighborhood, through such tools as CDBG program, would have a positive effect on neighborhood appearance

| Construction of a pedestrian bridge (overpass) to Lake June DART station | Design and construct a pedestrian overpass/bridge across CF Hawn Expwy at Jonelle Ave (or Sarah Lee Ln) including lighting and pathway signage to Lake June Green Line train station | 5 |
| Reconstruction of Elam Rd | Street reconstruction of Elam Road from Jim Miller Rd to Pemberton Hill Rd, including replacement of curb and gutter, sidewalks and streetcaping with pedestrian oriented lighting | 5 & 8 |
| Alley improvement | Improvement of the alley between Denham Dr and Fenway St (from Pindar Ave west to the end) including drainage and replacement of the alley pavement | 5 |
