**2. Public Safety Dashboards**

Public Safety Dashboards are intended to provide a comprehensive snapshot of performance measures, critical areas of concern, and staffing levels each month. Chief Hall led the discussion on the dashboards asking council if they had questions concerning trends or focus areas that need immediate attention. Councilmember Kingston would like clearance rates to be added back on the Dallas Police Department (DPD) Dashboard. Councilmember McGough shared concerns on response times for Priority 1 calls pertaining to the Northeast District. Chief Hall responded clearance rates will be added to the next dashboard and ensured they are working on response times; these times are mostly due to officers responding to accidents on Interstate Highway 635E. No questions were asked concerning Dallas Fire-Rescue or Courts Dashboards.

### 3. 21<sup>st</sup> Century Policing Best Practices for DPD

Presenter(s): Chief U. Renee Hall, Dallas Police Department

Information Only:

#### Action Taken/Committee Recommendation(s):

Chief Hall briefed council on 21<sup>st</sup> Century Policing Practices outlining why police reform is essential and provide seven proposed procedural changes. She stated this topic is a priority and part of her strategic plan put in place in March of this year. Chief Hall has looked at procedures throughout the police department to ensure DPD is in line with best practices across the country. A multitude of policies and procedures have been updated, and as they continue to review and audit DPD's operations and investigations, they want to ensure processes are streamlined. The procedural changes under review and consideration include: Officer Report Status, Establish Directives for Officer Interviews, Mandatory Testing, Communication with Community, Officer Wellness, Citizen Review Board, and Management Awareness System/ Early Warning System. Council asked for clarification on officer involved incidents and the 5-day report to be provided to the community. Chief Hall provided insight into critical officer involved incidents and what the procedures are before those employees can return to work to ensure officer and civilian health. The 5-day report is a status update on the who, what, where, how's of an investigation with next steps without compromising the investigation. Council also asked for a timeframe for implementation and impact of budget. This is projected to be completed within six months, budget would not be a large impact.

### 4. Implicit Bias Presentation

Staff briefed council on Implicit Bias and Social Justice. All officers of the Dallas Police Department receive training on implicit bias. The training includes the understanding that despite consciously rejecting stereotypes and supporting anti-discrimination efforts, people still unconsciously hold negative associations. Staff stated we all carry implicit biases, and this training helps to both identify them, and to temper their influence on our day to day decisions. The briefing detailed the different Dallas Police courses that cover implicit bias. The eight-hour course is voluntary; however, parts of the training are included in the mandatory core curriculum for officers. Curriculum is currently being revised to make this course required for all officers.

## 5. National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) Update

Presenter(s): Assistant Angela Shaw, Dallas Police Department

### Action Taken/Committee Recommendation(s):

Assistant Chief Angela Shaw presented the briefing on the Dallas Police Department's NIBRS Update. The presentation gave an overview of NIBRS and its implementation. NIBRS is an incident-based reporting system that collects data on each crime occurrence and collects data on each incident and arrest – distinguishing between attempted and completed. It also includes information on victims, known offenders, relationships between victims and offenders, arrestees, and property involved in the crimes. As of July 31, 2018, DPD is the largest agency in the US submitting NIBRS data. There are offense counting reporting differences between NIBRS and the UCR method of reporting. NIBRS will not summarize multiple incidents into one offense, as previously reported. There are challenges using NIBRS, specifically when doing multi-year comparisons, and the number of categories. The advantage of NIBRS is more accurate reporting. The move will make the department more transparent.

# Purpose

- The purpose is to provide an overview of the benefits of reporting Class C family violence convictions to the Department of Public Safety(DPS).
  - “Family violence is a serious danger and threat to society and its members. Victims of family violence are entitled to the maximum protection from harm or abuse or the threat of harm or abuse as is permitted by law”.

*Source: Article 5.01 Texas Code of Criminal Procedure*

# Benefits of Reporting to DPS

Reporting Class C family violence convictions from the municipal court will allow:

- Increased protection for victims of family violence.
- Enhancements of any future family violence offenses.
  - Convictions in Municipal Court may be used to enhance future family offenses in County Courts.
- The expansion of the disability to possess or purchase a firearm for a Class C family violence conviction (Texas limits disability to five years).
  - United States Code Section 922(g)(9) makes it unlawful for any person who has been convicted in any court of a misdemeanor crime of domestic violence to purchase or possess a firearm.

# History

- It is mandatory that Counties report family violence convictions for all offenses higher than a Class C misdemeanor.
- Municipalities are not required to report Class C family violence convictions to DPS but may voluntarily report family violence convictions.
  - San Antonio started manually reporting family violence convictions in March 2018.

# City of Dallas Implementation Efforts

- The City of Dallas Domestic Violence Task Force requested Court and Detention Services (CDS) to investigate reporting family violence convictions to DPS. The Administrative Judge expressed support of the program.
- CDS developed family violence reporting requirements and began procurement of Live Scan (fingerprinting) equipment.
- CDS has received Live Scan equipment and Court personnel have been trained by DPS.
- Class C family violence convictions will be electronically reported to DPS in late October 2018.

# Process - Municipal Court

- Upon conviction (Guilty or No-Contest plea) of a Class C family violence offense:
  - Individuals will be immediately fingerprinted in one of three locations; Lew Sterrett Justice Center, City Detention Center or Municipal Court Building.
  - Individuals will be released to visit with staff to satisfy case requirements.
  - Court staff will enter conviction information into both the court case management system and the DPS Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS).

# Process - (cont.)

- The conviction information will be placed on the individual's Texas Crime Information Center (TCIC - DPS) criminal history after it is entered into CJIS.
- Conviction information is forwarded to the FBI for entry into the National Crime Information Center (NCIC).
- The NCIC information is used for the National Instant Criminal Background Check System for firearms background checks.

# Next Steps

- Consider legislation for 2019:
  - Make family violence conviction reporting mandatory for municipalities.
  - Enhance Municipal Judge jurisdiction for family violence related cases.
- Evaluate the feasibility of a Gun Surrender Program.
- Continue and expand programs with partners.
  - Agencies such as Texas Council on Family Violence
  - Religious Organizations and non-profits

# Background

- The Board of Adjustment (BDA) is a fifteen-member citizen board divided into three, five-member panels appointed by the City Council to hear and take appropriate action on variances and exceptions to Development Code regulations, consider appeals to decisions of the Building Official, and consider termination of nonconforming uses.
- Nonconforming use means a use that does not conform to the current use regulations of Dallas Development Code, but was lawfully established and has been in regular use since that time.
- Compliance regulations for nonconforming uses allow that nonconforming uses be eliminated, having due regard for the property rights of the persons affected, the public welfare, and the character of the surrounding area.
- Chapter 51A addresses discontinuance of a nonconforming use whereby the owner's actual investment in the structure prior to the time that the use became nonconforming can be amortized in setting the compliance date.

# Initiation

- City Council, via a five member signed memo, may request that the Board of Adjustment consider establishing a compliance date for a nonconforming use.
- Any person who resides or owns real property in the city and pays the \$1,000 application fee may also make the same request.

# First Public Hearing

- Board of Adjustment (BDA) holds a public hearing to determine whether continued operation of the nonconforming use will have an adverse effect on nearby properties.
- Both sides are given limited time.
  - Property owner of nonconforming use attempts to prove no adverse effect on nearby properties.
  - Applicant(s) and, if desired, neighbors and other interested parties attempt to prove adverse effect on nearby properties.

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# Factors BDA Considers

- (i) The character of the surrounding neighborhood.
- (ii) The degree of incompatibility of the use with the zoning district in which it is located.
- (iii) The manner in which the use is being conducted.
- (iv) The hours of operation of the use.
- (v) The extent to which continued operation of the use may threaten public health or safety.
- (vi) The environmental impacts of the use's operation, including but not limited to the impacts of noise, glare, dust, and odor.
- (vii) The extent to which public disturbances may be created or perpetuated by continued operation of the use.
- (viii) The extent to which traffic or parking problems may be created or perpetuated by continued operation of the use.
- (ix) Any other factors relevant to the issue of whether continued operation of the use will adversely affect nearby properties.

# Evidence of Adverse Effect

- Types of evidence to prove adverse effect may include:
  - Police records
  - Code Compliance records
  - Testimony of neighbors
  - Regulatory actions against the use
  - Secondary effects of the use on nearby properties such as property values, neighborhood decay, loss of business, etc.

# Outcome of First Public Hearing

- If no adverse effect is found, the case is over and the nonconforming use retains its nonconforming rights and may continue operations.
- If adverse effect is found, the case moves to the second public hearing.
  - BDA requests records from the property owner regarding investment in the property.

# Second Public Hearing

- The compliance date for the nonconforming use is based on the owner's actual investment in the use before the time that the use became nonconforming and can be amortized within a definite time period.
- Setting the compliance date considers the owners anticipated recovery of investment.

# Discontinuation of Use

- The use must cease operations on the date set by BDA.
  - Revocation of Certificate of Occupancy
  - Criminal prosecution
  - Civil lawsuit
- The owner may seek a zoning change to make the use conforming to continue operation.

# Upcoming Initiation Consideration

- On October 24, 2018, Council will consider initiating a request for the Board of Adjustment to consider determining a compliance date for a nonconforming use at 2702 Martin Luther King, Jr. Boulevard.

SUBJECT **RIGHT Care Program Update**

On Monday, October 8, 2018, you will be briefed on the RIGHT Care program. RIGHT Care is a 3-year granted funded program supported by the W.W. Caruth Jr. Foundation with Meadows Mental Health Policy Institute oversight. The program was launched on Monday, January 29, 2018, as a multidisciplinary emergency response team to manage individuals experiencing behavioral health crises in the Dallas Police South Central District. The response team includes a DFR paramedic, DPD police officer and Parkland Hospital Mental Health clinician. All team members have received specialized training. Some of the objectives of the team include hospital and emergency room diversion for behavioral health patients as well as linking these individuals to specialized care aimed at treating their condition. The briefing will include discussion of data analytics tied to RIGHT Care since launch as well as success stories regarding how the program has positively impacted the lives of individuals receiving care.

This program has also received national attention as U.S. congressional members including Senator John Cornyn and Pete Sessions who have visited Dallas to be briefed on how RIGHT Care functions and its impact to public safety.



# What is RIGHT Care?

- RIGHT Care is a multidisciplinary response team designed to help divert Behavioral Health Patients from Jails and Hospitals
  - Historically, first responders were not trained to handle this demographic
  - Incarceration and ER hospitalization were viewed as limited options to handle Behavioral Health Patients

# Better Management of Behavioral Health Patients in the Field

- The need for better 911 emergency response, education and management was identified as a need for the City of Dallas
- A consortium of stakeholders designed a multidisciplinary team for response to 911 calls involving Behavioral Health Patients
- 3 Year Pilot Program-Grant Funded by W.W. Caruth, Jr. Foundation through the Meadows Mental Health Policy Institute (MMHPI) focused on the South Central Dallas Police District (spans through May 31, 2020)


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# Program Development Mission

- **Super-utilizers**
  - More than 6,000 “repeat callers” in Dallas, with 4,000 living in poverty
  - Inadequate health care and case management-ONLY **1 in 7** are under care for their condition
  - Recidivism-75% are jailed repeatedly
- **Community-based and inpatient behavioral health care services**
  - Super-utilizers need ongoing intensive care, housing, and supervision

- Medical Direction through DFR (i.e., development of policies/procedures and consultation)


# RIGHT Care Team Objectives

- Provide comprehensive on scene evaluation services to individuals experiencing behavioral health crises
- Ensure continuity of care following stabilization and better patient disposition
- Provide prevention and intervention services for behavioral healthcare
- Reduce behavioral health calls requiring DPD patrol officer and DFR ambulance response

# Program Data Analysis

- RIGHT Care launched January 2018
- Between January 29-September 9, 2018-1,679 calls answered by the team
- Major response dispositions:
  - 53 arrests, (3% of total interactions)
    - 29 for previous warrants (2%)
    - 24 new offense on-scene (1%)

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# Program Data Analysis

- 94 individuals were transported to an outpatient clinic (6%), 43 individuals linked to a psychiatric facility via RIGHT Care or a family member (3%)
- 75 individuals-transported to a hospital by ambulance (4%), 77 individuals linked to housing resources (5%),

# Program Data Analysis

- 25 individuals linked to Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) (1%), 257 individuals provided with other resources and referrals (15%)
- 268 individuals apprehended for psychiatric evaluation (APOWW) (16%), 268 individuals were engaged with follow-up and outreach with the team (16%), other categories (31%)

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# Program Success Stories

## Improved care for Dallas Citizens and Safety for our responders
